

INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE CELL 2016 - 2017

Preamble

The College holds itself accountable to the stakeholders: the students, their parents, serving and former staff, alumnae, the funding agencies and the parent University. It understands that it is answerable also to the society at large. The college endeavours to be fair, transparent and culturally sensitive in all that it undertakes. Through the college website, it makes public relevant policies, decisions and data.

Oversight Mechanism: To accomplish its mission of quality teaching-learning, the college designed an Oversight Mechanism as an independent and objective assurance activity. Specifically, the stated objectives of the oversight mechanism are to ensure:

- well-informed and systematic implementation of all processes;
- effective organization of teaching-learning so that the needs of each and every student are served and grievances, if any addressed appropriately;
- the evaluation process is systematic, objective, impartial and transparent with inbuilt mechanism for timely feedback to the student;
- the evaluation process is evidence-based and reliable measure of students' learning, teaching, continuous evaluation and feedback is uniformly executed across different sections of teaching;
- appropriate mechanisms for moderation of evaluation across sections are setup;
- students are given adequate support and remedial opportunities as they work towards achieving the learning objectives;
- the college remains accountable to students, their parents and the University;
- short-comings in the organization, implementation and monitoring of all processes are recognized and remedial measures adopted for iterative improvement.

The Oversight Mechanisms assume great significance in the context of Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) where flexibility, freedom to choose from a range of courses, and requirement of compulsory courses for large cohorts necessitate large number of multi-ability, multi-disciplinary sections be taught the same course by different teachers. This raises questions on standardization of teaching, student satisfaction and assessment. For instance, the freshman class of 1000 are required to study Ability Enhancing Compulsory Courses (AECC) on Language Communication and on Environmental Science. In the odd semester, Group A consisting of about 500 students study Language Communication in 10 distinct sections and Group B with another 500 students studies Environmental Science, again in 10 sections. In the even semester, the groups interchange. On varying scales, similar challenges are successfully addressed with utmost quality assurance in teaching.

With a view to address quality in teaching and the functioning of the college, the college had proactively decided to establish the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC).



In their meeting held on 20 November 2015, the Governing Body granted formal approval to the newly constituted IQAC.

MINUTES

1 August 2016

An internal meeting of the IQAC was held in the Committee Room at 3pm.

The agenda of this meeting was

- Admissions 2016-17
- Discussion on the Add-on Certificate Courses offered by the various departments
- Result analysis
- Remedial teaching
- Submission of the College SSR to NAAC in July 2016

The Principal informed the members of the number of students admitted under the various courses.

The Principal informed that Add-on Courses are an important part of enrichment initiatives. Some guidelines were suggested for these courses:

- A detailed proposal for this year's course. This should include last year's report (already submitted for Annual Report but a copy to go into the appropriate file);
- Statement of accounts for the last year;
- Critical review of the course and students feedback
- Challenges faced if any and proposal to overcome these challenges
- Schedule for this year along with a tentative list of resource persons; publicity material; budget proposal.
- A review by an expert advisory committee was also suggested.

The Convener, Academic Committee informed that the Teachers-in-Charge of the various departments would also be analysing the result and presenting the same in the next Academic Committee meeting.

As the students admitted in the undergraduate programmes were from diverse educational boards and backgrounds, departments were advised to hold remedial/bridge courses where ever possible.

Since the College NAAC report had been submitted in July 2016, the IQAC was aware that the NAAC Peer Team visit would be soon.



15 November 2016

An internal meeting of the IQAC was held in the Committee Room at 3pm.

The agenda of the meeting was an overview of the national and international programmes and collaborations. Collaborations with various national and international organizations, institutions and Universities is being undertaken to understand bench marks in higher education. The college is being approached by many Universities for collaborations. The members of the IQAC were of the opinion that lectures by scholars from the Universities would enable students to make an informed decision about the various higher education/career advancement course being offered there.

A sub-committee was constituted to speak to the Librarian for a Web OPAC usage Seminar.

The IQAC members were informed about the 3D printer that has been installed in the Department of Physics.

E-pathshala have developed on-line surveys under a practice of Green Audits for the college.

Honeybee have conducted a Smart Building survey. The college has scored only 47% due to the absence of lifts.

Dr Reema Bhatia informed the members of the 96 QR Codes installed in various locations of the college to assist the visually challenged students.

16 February 2017

A combined meeting of the Academic Committee and the IQAC was held in the Seminar Room at 3pm.

The result analysis for the 2016-17 Odd Semester results was discussed. Members present understood the various terms in the students' marksheets: Credit, Grade Letter, Grade Point, Credit Point, SGPA.

There was a suggestion that the Dean Examinations, University of Delhi be invited to deliver a lecture to explain the conversion of grades to marks. The Principal informed the members present that she would try and organize this at the earliest.

The college has invested resources in development of custom designed software packages for Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP). These are periodically upgraded to meet new requirements. For example, administrative staff provides faculty timely information on student admissions, demographic profile, course options exercised by students, distribution of students across courses and sections, examinations to take.

The course allows flexibility, freedom to choose from a range of courses, and a requirement of compulsory courses for large cohorts. This necessitates large number of multi-ability, multi-disciplinary sections which need to be taught the same course by different teachers. Since the students admitted in the undergraduate programmes are from diverse educational boards and backgrounds, departments are advised to hold remedial/bridge course where ever possible. To ensure correct calculation of Department Workload, the Workload Committee has designed

a form for all optional papers: Generic Elective, Skill Enhancement Courses and Discipline Specific Elective which are filled by the students well in advance of an upcoming semester. This data also enables the Timetable Committee to plan the room requirements for the next semester/ academic year.

The NAAC Peer Team visited the College in end March 2017. The NAAC Accreditation score was announced in the first week of May 2017. Every effort will be made by Miranda House to incorporate the suggestions of the NAAC Peer Team to ensure effective teaching-learning and efficient functioning of the college.
