11. Significant contributions made by IQAC during the current year (maximum five bullets)

The IQAC through the Academic Committee of the College draws up and academic plan for the academic year, ensuring that all classes are conducted as per schedule without any disruption. Semesterwise, faculty records are assessed, leave records are examined and substitution arrangements are made as per existing guidelines, so that students are provided with necessary teacher numbers at the beginning of each semester. All options under SEC, VAC, GE and DSE are floated and students are required to provide feedback in terms of their expression of interest. This provides crucial information on workload allocation and fine tuning class sizes and their allocation to write he number of students in each class per paper. Deadlines regarding IA/CA submissions and academic progress records are set in advance to encourage timely completion of teaching as per schedule. Lesson plans are discussed and timelines set to make space for all other activities that support and enhance the academic experience in the college and provide a holistic learning ecosystem. 1. Teaching Learning management and continuous improvement in the learning ecosystem: The overall upkeep of the teaching and learning process and it's operational details are supervised by the IQAC. Faculty members are encouraged to participate in major syllabus revision and in continuous syllabus updation processes and all instructions supporting the syllabus are followed. Enhancements in the teaching pedagogy supplemented through co-curricular, extracurricular and extra academic activities like collaborative teaching, peer reviewing, lecture demonstrations both through inhouse and external invitations and continuous improvement of infrastructure and logistic support for nurturing latest pedagogy are encouraged. The institution conducts and encourages faculty participation in FDPs and Refresher courses to imbibe the newest pedagogical techniques and strengthen the learning environment. IQAC uses surveys, reports, feedbacks and discussions to get inputs on the quality from all the stakeholders involved. Internal Assessment (IA) and Continuous Assessment (CA), as mandated by the university

evaluation procedures, are diligently followed through the college Academic Committee. Teachers promote collaborative and problem-based learning (PBL) to enhance student engagement and foster critical thinking and intellectual growth.

2. Strengthening Research and Innovation - Under the aegis of IQAC, MH has created a conducive research environment through initiatives such as arranging and disbursing research grants, organisation of seminars, capacity building workshops and conferences to promote exchange of ideas and intellectual dialogue. In particular, the college supports faculty members to conduct cutting-edge, interdisciplinary, innovative research in different disciplines. To facilitate research by faculty and UG students, the R & D cell of the college has set up a special grant and sanctioned 36 projects to the college faculty. Students are also a part of these projects. This will promote interdisciplinary research and provide experiential learning to the undergraduate students and help them to publish and present their research work at national and international forums. A large number of multidisciplinary research centres have been established by the college with assistance from the Government of India and corporate funding agencies. MH has created space for setting up new research centre such as Urban Study and Research Centre inaugurated by MoHUA. For inclusivity and resource utilization, MH has continued sharing utilization of infrastructure facilities for NCWEB, IGNOU and SOL. The Journal MLPR (Miranda Law and Policy) under the aegis of the Legal Aid Centre and Policy Centre & Gender Lab, Miranda House, peer-reviewed and annually published, seeks to promote scholarship on the confluence of law and public policy issues and its impact on governance and society. Centre for Sanskrit Learning under the framework of Indian Knowledge System was established to promote research in Sanskrit. In collaboration with National Mission for Manuscripts, Ministry of Culture, GoI, a national workshop on Epigraphy and Manuscriptology was organized to initiate research on manuscripts and epigraphy. MH has collaborated with govt. and non-govt. agencies to organize training and sensitization workshops. An awareness workshop in collaboration with Mahatma Gandhi Institute for Combating Climate Change (MGICCC), Govt. of NCT of Delhi was organized for the training and sensitization of sanitation/ essential workers and nonteaching staff on waste management practices. Green Audit, Energy Audit, Environment Audit, Accessibility Audit; and Water Balance report for the academic year were done. MoU was signed with Bisleri Bottles of Change CSR for collection and recycling of single use plastic. The MH TechPark has waste management facilities viz., composting, paper recycling and hydroponics for grey water recycling. MH Vatavaran, the environment society organizes several

awareness and plantation drives. The Centre for Environmental Studies and Disaster Management (CESDM) organizes seminars, workshops and courses to sensitize and enhance the skills in the students from different disciplines, so that they can apply their core subject knowledge to resolve the issues of disaster management and environmental degradation. The beautiful green spaces of the college are maintained by the Garden Committee with the help of gardeners and other workers. The college participates in the University Flower Show and has won the prestigious Vice-Chancellor's Cup many times. "Nakshatra Vanam" based on ancient conservation practices, Panchvatika to symbolize environmental perfection and a vegetable garden are also developed in the college. 11. Significant contributions made by IQAC during the current year (maximum five bullets)

The IQAC through the Academic Committee of the College draws up and academic plan for the academic year, ensuring that all classes are conducted as per schedule without any disruption. Semesterwise, faculty records are assessed, leave records are examined and substitution arrangements are made as per existing quidelines, so that students are provided with necessary teacher numbers at the beginning of each semester. All options under SEC, VAC, GE and DSE are floated and students are required to provide feedback in terms of their expression of interest. This provides crucial information on workload allocation and fine tuning class sizes and their allocation to write he number of students in each class per paper. Deadlines regarding IA/CA submissions and academic progress records are set in advance to encourage timely completion of teaching as per schedule. Lesson plans are discussed and timelines set to make space for all other activities that support and enhance the academic experience in the college and provide a holistic learning ecosystem. 1. Teaching Learning management and continuous improvement in the learning ecosystem: The overall upkeep of the teaching and learning process and it's operational details are supervised by the IQAC. Faculty members are encouraged to participate in major

syllabus revision and in continuous syllabus updation processes and all instructions supporting the syllabus are followed. Enhancements in the teaching pedagogy supplemented through cocurricular, extracurricular and extra academic activities like collaborative teaching, peer reviewing, lecture demonstrations both through inhouse and external invitations and continuous improvement of infrastructure and logistic support for nurturing latest pedagogy are encouraged. The institution conducts and encourages faculty participation in FDPs and Refresher courses to imbibe the newest pedagogical techniques and strengthen the learning environment. IQAC uses surveys, reports, feedbacks and discussions to get inputs on the quality from all the stakeholders involved. Internal Assessment (IA) and Continuous Assessment (CA), as mandated by the university evaluation procedures, are diligently followed through the college Academic Committee. Teachers promote collaborative and problem-based learning (PBL) to enhance student engagement and foster critical thinking and intellectual growth.

2. Strengthening Research and Innovation - Under the aegis of IQAC, MH has created a conducive research environment through initiatives such as arranging and disbursing research grants, organisation of seminars, capacity building workshops and conferences to promote exchange of ideas and intellectual dialogue. In particular, the college supports faculty members to conduct cutting-edge, interdisciplinary, innovative research in different disciplines. To facilitate research by faculty and UG students, the R & D cell of the college has set up a special grant and sanctioned 36 projects to the college faculty. Students are also a part of these projects. This will promote interdisciplinary research and provide experiential learning to the undergraduate students and help them to publish and present their research work at national and international forums. A large number of multidisciplinary research centres have been established by the college with assistance from the Government of India and corporate funding agencies. MH has created space for setting up new research centre such as Urban Study and Research Centre inaugurated by MoHUA. For inclusivity and resource utilization, MH has continued sharing utilization of infrastructure facilities for NCWEB, IGNOU and SOL. The Journal MLPR (Miranda Law and Policy) under the aegis of the Legal Aid Centre and Policy Centre & Gender Lab, Miranda House, peerreviewed and annually published, seeks to promote scholarship on the confluence of law and public policy issues and its impact on governance and society. Centre for Sanskrit Learning under the framework of Indian Knowledge System was established to promote

research in Sanskrit. In collaboration with National Mission for Manuscripts, Ministry of Culture, GoI, a national workshop on Epigraphy and Manuscriptology was organized to initiate research on manuscripts and epigraphy. MH has collaborated with govt. and non-govt. agencies to organize training and sensitization workshops. An awareness workshop in collaboration with Mahatma Gandhi Institute for Combating Climate Change (MGICCC), Govt. of NCT of Delhi was organized for the training and sensitization of sanitation/ essential workers and non-teaching staff on waste management practices. Green Audit, Energy Audit, Environment Audit, Accessibility Audit; and Water Balance report for the academic year were done. MoU was signed with Bisleri Bottles of Change CSR for collection and recycling of single use plastic. The MH TechPark has waste management facilities viz., composting, paper recycling and hydroponics for grey water recycling. MH Vatavaran, the environment society organizes several awareness and plantation drives. The Centre for Environmental Studies and Disaster Management (CESDM) organizes seminars, workshops and courses to sensitize and enhance the skills in the students from different disciplines, so that they can apply their core subject knowledge to resolve the issues of disaster management and environmental degradation. The beautiful green spaces of the college are maintained by the Garden Committee with the help of gardeners and other workers. The college participates in the University Flower Show and has won the prestigious Vice-Chancellor's Cup many times. "Nakshatra Vanam" based on ancient conservation practices, Panchvatika to symbolize environmental perfection and a vegetable garden are also developed in the college. Campus Nature walks, Herbal garden, Carbon foot print project studies, Solar panels are all a part of sustainable practices at MH.

- 3. Stakeholder Engagement and Feedback Mechanisms: IQAC values stakeholders' opinions in decision-making processes by involving them in regular communication channels and feedback mechanisms. This encourages transparency, accountability and inclusivity hence strengthening the link between the college and its stakeholders. All faculty members receive feedback on how to implement cutting-edge teaching strategies. Feedback is disseminated to all faculty members to encourage the implementation of innovative teaching methods.
- 4. Enhancement of Digital Platform: Miranda House has operated through its own digital platform acad ME for more than nine years. IQAC has contributed towards the enhancement of this digital interface for faculty as well as students in order to

collect, manage, compile and safe guard all records of achievements, progression, projects and research collaborations.

5. Teachers' Progression: IQAC is steadfastly dedicated to supporting and facilitating teachers' career advancement. The IQAC team oversees timely promotion as per screening guidelines as available time to time.

15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

MH has successfully embraced the NEP, which provides a dynamic framework prioritizing multidisciplinary flexibility and student autonomy. With 18 departments across various disciplines, MH is uniquely positioned to offer a wide range of courses that cater to diverse interests and aspirations of its students. The inclusion of Discipline-Specific Electives (DSEs) and Generic Electives (GEs) empowers students to customize their academic journey, allowing them to explore multiple disciplines in line with their individual interests and career goals. This flexible framework also provides students with the opportunity for multiple entry and exit points. Skill Enhancement Courses (SECs) and Value Addition Courses (VACs) ensure that students gain exposure to a broad range of fields, including sciences, humanities, languages, and vocational areas. For example, the VAC course on Ethics and Values in Ancient Indian Tradition attracted students from disciplines such as Humanities, Arts, and Science, including Math, Sociology, Geography, Hindi, Chemistry, English, Zoology, History, and Physics. Similarly, the Visual Communication and Photography course, taught by the Sociology department, saw participation from students across various departments. Centers like the Policy Centre and Gender Lab (PCGL), the North Eastern Regional Research and Resource Centre (NERRRC), and the Centre for Environmental Studies and Disaster Management (CESDM) foster interdisciplinarity by organizing workshops on research methodology, training programs, speaker sessions, and capacity development initiatives. These programs are well-attended by students from all disciplines. By promoting collaboration across departments, Miranda House provides students with an immersive educational experience that transcends traditional academic boundaries, nurturing a well-rounded perspective.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

MH is a constituent college of University of Delhi and thus it adheres to all its regulations. MH adheres to National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, which includes the establishment of the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC). As part of this mandate, colleges are instructed to ensure that all students register on the ABC portal. The ABC portal serves as a repository for tracking all credits earned by students, enabling the transfer of credits from courses taken outside the college or university. The University of Delhi specifies the credit requirements for degree awards, in line with the NEP 2020 framework. Additionally, the ABC system supports multiple exit options, allowing students to design their

own degree programs. Miranda House encourages students to actively manage and track their earned credits through the ABC.

17.Skill development:

Miranda House integrates skill development into its curriculum, offering multiple Skill Enhancement Courses (SECs) under University of Delhi's NEP 2020 framework. These courses emphasize practical learning in areas like digital literacy, entrepreneurship, data analytics, financial literacy, communication, and environmental sustainability etc. By combining vocational skills with academic knowledge, SECs enhance employability, foster innovation, and prepare students for industry demands while promoting inclusivity and global competence. The college supports students with remedial, bridge, and add-on courses to address individual strengths and weaknesses. In alignment with Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojna (PMKVY), its Skill Hub trains women and school dropouts in entrepreneurial skills. Platforms like the Legal Aid Centre, TULA, Enactus, and the Entrepreneurship Cell amplify employability, social responsibility, and innovation. Additionally, the Multilingual Digital Language Lab enhances language and communication skills. The Millet and Food Incubation Centre empowers women from the community, aligning with India's vision of promoting millets for nutrition, climate resilience, and economic growth. Similarly, Project Bloom, a bamboo incubation initiative under NERRRC, fosters sustainable bamboobased businesses, empowering women through mentorship, business development, and market access. By integrating skill training with sustainability and entrepreneurship, Miranda House contributes to holistic education, livelihood opportunities, and community development

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Miranda House has adopted an integrated approach to enhancing the Indian Knowledge System (IKS) within its academic framework. The college offers courses in five Indian languages—Hindi, Sanskrit, Bengali, Tamil, and Punjabi—and houses a library with a curated collection of ancient epigraphic plates in Sanskrit and Pali. Cultural activities and language-based programs encourage students to engage with India's rich heritage. Additionally, the curriculum includes subjects like Vedic Mathematics, Indian Political Thought, Ayurveda and Nutrition, which naturally incorporate traditional knowledge, further aligning with the broader vision of preserving and promoting IKS. Regular yoga

practice at the college also integrates physical wellness with spiritual and mental well-being, emphasizing holistic development. This commitment to IKS extends beyond academics. The Multilingual Digital Language Lab works on preserving ancient scriptures through research and translations in various Indian languages, while the Millet and Food Incubation Centre revives millet cultivation-a practice deeply embedded in India's agricultural tradition, promoting both ecological sustainability and nutrition. Further, the college's environmental sustainability efforts, such as Nakshatravanam and Panchvatika, align with IKS by conserving biodiversity and promoting health through the cultivation of indigenous plants. The Nakshatravanam links 27 Nakshatras to specific trees, supporting ecological balance, while the Panchvatika features five sacred trees known for their medicinal properties, blending environmental conservation with traditional healing practices. Through these initiatives, Miranda House strengthens its contribution to preserving IKS.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

As a constituent college of University of Delhi, Miranda House had implemented the NEP-UGCF in BA Honours, BA Multidisciplinary, BSc Hons and BSc programmes in 2022. The course structure includes well-defined learning objectives, learning outcome, detailed rubrics, essential readings and wide range of mechanisms for continuous assessment. The students are encouraged to engage with the curriculum through research projects, laboratory experiments, practical, field visits and project reports. The introduction of Skill Enhancement Courses and Value-Added Courses has enabled the students to derive multidisciplinary knowledge as well as enhance their skills and expertise. The common pool of courses range from Basic IT Tools, Advanced Spreadsheets to Yoga and Organic Farming. The faculty members monitor student progression through a wide range of assessments, mentor students to ensure their overall growth and provide regular feedback to students so that the desired learning outcome of the undergraduate programme are met. The Add on and Certificate Courses, Symposiums, Panel Discussion, Lecture Series enable students to engage with themes beyond the curriculum. The student societies, clubs and internships provide an ecosystem for students to understand the real-world scenarios, challenges and opportunities.

20.Distance education/online education:

Miranda House serves as a Learner Support Centre (29065) for

IGNOU. The center provides online sessions with academic counsellors for select undergraduate and postgraduate courses. The academic counsellors from social science and science disciplines conduct online sessions through Google Meet for students. The online assignment submission portal and related quidelines are provided to the students. Miranda House serves as a Teaching Center for the Non-Collegiate Women's Education Board (NCWEB) of University of Delhi. Every weekend a large number NCWEB students attend classes in college. These intensive sixhour classes for BA Programme and BCom students provides optimum learning opportunities for the students. These students have not enrolled as regular students of the college but benefit from the offline classes conducted in the college. The college utilizes several online pedagogical tools to promote outcome-based learning. Acad Me app, Google Classroom and e-learning resources of the library are immensely useful in facilitating learning. Seminars and lectures are regularly held by all the departments in Miranda House. To ensure that the students have access to insights and perspectives of scholars of international repute, the faculty members organize online lectures through platforms such as Zoom and Google Meet.

1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

MH follows the academic calendar of University of Delhi, adhering to its admission procedures, teaching schedules, mid-semester breaks, and holidays. Each academic year begins with a fresher's orientation program designed to familiarize students with the academic schedule, curriculum, and extracurricular opportunities. During orientation, students are introduced to components of Internal Assessment (IA), which is carefully designed to support achievement of course learning outcomes. Students are given ample opportunities to refine their assessments based on constructive feedback and remedial sessions. Interactive tutorials and practical sessions provide support, offering a platform for students to clarify doubts and facilitate smooth learning. Research and writing skills are further developed through dedicated workshops and training sessions. Internal Assessment (IA) marks are uploaded on the DU portal after undergoing moderation by both the departmental and College Moderation Committees. At the end of each semester, individual departments analyse the results, which are then discussed in the Academic Committee. Recommendations for improvements in future semesters are deliberated upon to continuously enhance the academic process.

To promote values through academic engagement, MH offers a range of integrated courses that aim to foster a deeper connection to Indian culture and knowledge systems, integrity, teamwork, empathy, and respect. North Eastern Regional Research and Resource Centre fosters inclusivity, offers research-oriented internships, and nurtures meaningful student connections.

MH-Vatavaran conducts programs to raise awareness about environmental sustainability. Students are involved in initiatives such as Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, tree plantation drives, neighbourhood cleanliness campaigns etc. Additionally, sustainability efforts are supported through projects like paper recycling, hydroponics, and composting units.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Classrooms, laboratories, computer equipment, and other physical facilities are all a part of the institution's strong infrastructure for teaching and learning. The majority of the classrooms are equipped with multimedia features, and Wi-Fi is available across the campus. Regular improvements and upgrades for the newest amenities are performed to maintain the quality of teaching and learning. The college's acad ME app, a software module is used to encourage an open and interactive teaching-learning environment. This app also has an online internal assessment module that includes a built-in system for calculating attendance and cumulative exam and quiz results.

MH has multimedia enabled two auditoriums, seminar hall, conference room, five porta cabins, two atriums, and two committee rooms with EVOTA projection systems. Modern audio-visual equipment is installed in its two auditoriums, which have capacities of 450 and 170. The applied social science and policy research centres and six transdisciplinary research laboratories support research and education.

With its two digital resource centres and six specialty departments, the MH library enhances the college's vast learning infrastructure. Web OPAC and DULS are used to enable access to digital resources. Modern, ergonomic workstations are used for the administration, accounting, library, hostel, and other various service offices.

Co-curricular, cultural, and athletic activities are crucial to MH's focus on the vibrant and comprehensive development of students. Students have access to excellent resources for cultural clubs and sports facilities. Outdoor theatre, arcades, cafeteria lawns, front lawns, sports fields, and hostel lawns, are used for a range of cultural events. Indoor cultural events, including dance, theatre, music concerts, workshops, and panel discussions, are held in learning studios such as the Student Activity Centre and Heritage Hall.

In addition, MH has a thriving physical education department that offers intramural sports as well as morning yoga, aerobics, and leisure activities. There are two open gyms, a large sports field and an air-conditioned multigym facility with free weight and cardio training equipment. To encourage regular yoga practice for mental and emotional stability, self-discipline, physical, and spiritual well-being, MH offers a certificate course called "Foundations of Yogasana". The college observes International Yoga Day annually.

MH has divyangjan friendly facilities such as ramp, tactile paths and QR codes are displayed outside classrooms to provide easy accessibility. The college has medical room facility and has installed sanitary napkin vending machines.

The college's internet connection speed is more than 100 Mbps with an additional Wi-Fi connection from Tata-TeleBusiness Services via an RF link with a bandwidth of 30 Mbps. In order to facilitate online webinars, workshops, and meetings for a large number of participants, MH has purchased two licensed editions of Zoom, each of which can accommodate up to 100 participants, respectively. Improvements include the installation of additional 7 indoor access points for hostel and purchase of 30 i7 desktops for DRC.

MH has a systematic approach to maintain and improve its academic, administrative, and physical infrastructure facilities. Committees are in charge of maintaining the laboratories, library, garden, cafeteria, and sports complex. The laboratories are upgraded regularly for the equipment and safety standards, and departments meet frequently in the Academic committee to discuss academic affairs. The college invites e-tenders for repairs and maintenance. Financial regulations (GoI, GFR 2021) are adhered to in all financial affairs. All electronic payments are done using secure direct bank transfer gateways, and salaries are distributed via the Public Financial Management System (PFMS), a financial management platform. While the IT team maintains and inspects IT systems and hardware, the library committee oversees purchasing materials and making sure the library runs smoothly. The garden committee is in charge of maintaining and using the gardens and lawns. The building committee, which is in charge of maintaining the college's infrastructure, is made up of the Principal, Vice Principal, Bursar, IQAC Coordinator, Section Officer of Accounts, Administration Officer of Administration, Site Engineer and Governing Body representatives.

MH fosters a democratic environment that prioritizes student participation, ensuring every voice is valued in academic and extracurricular spheres. This inclusive ethos is reflected in various student-led initiatives across the college.

At the centre of student governance is the Students' Union (MHSU), elected annually, which organizes diverse events throughout the academic year. MHSU collaborates with numerous societies and clubs, led by elected office-bearers, offering activities that enrich the academic experience.

The National Service Scheme (NSS) and National Cadet Corps (NCC) are integral to co-curricular engagement, with leadership roles entrusted to elected student representatives. Students are represented by a centralized union, and non-teaching staff is managed by the administrative officer. MH focuses on providing a conducive environment for enhancing the research capabilities of both students and faculties. In order to enhance the research activities among the faculties and the students the college has an established R&D cell that in 2023-24 awarded 36 inter-disciplinary projects. The total number of research projects is more than 60 with more than Rs. 22 crores.

MH has the highest number of research centres supported by

government and non-government agencies. R&D has a number of research projects for faculties and students from MH, other DU colleges and other universities. Multiple MoUs are functioning leading to joint research with universities like Guelph, Wisconsin etc.

A strong legacy of organizing summer workshops is there at MH for increasing the research capabilities of the students and faculties like DSKC workshops where students come from across the country. College has tie ups with various agencies like TIFAC and also some western countries. The college is home to several centres and laboratories that encourage collaborative research. These include the Multidisciplinary Research Laboratory, DSKC, PCGL, USRC and the NERRC.

MH appoints students as research assistants for various multidisciplinary projects where students are encouraged to publish research papers along with the faculties.

Miranda House adheres to all ordinances and statutory regulations of the University of Delhi regarding the Code of Conduct and Professional Ethics. The college has developed specific policies for e-governance, creating an inclusive and accessible campus, promoting environmental sustainability, and offering various financial assistance programs for students from socially and economically disadvantaged backgrounds.

The college's Governing Body approves and implements plans related to infrastructure development and financial matters, while the Principal oversees all administrative and academic functions. The administrative staff is responsible for documenting and maintaining all records. In the 2023-24 academic session, several appointments and promotions were made for both teaching and nonteaching staff. The service records of all employees are kept by

the administrative office. The IQAC plays a key role in evaluating and institutionalizing the college's best practices, conducting regular audits, and maintaining records. The Staff Council, as the decision-making body, approves the formation of committees and key academic decisions. The Internal Complaints Committee, which includes faculty members, non-teaching staff, and elected student representatives, addresses issues related to sexual harassment. 6.3 - Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 - The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

The college adheres to the central government's welfare policies, which include rules for casual leave, earned leave, medical leave, Child Care Leave (CCL) and other leave entitlements. It also

provides maternity and paternity leave with associated benefits. Miranda House offers Leave Travel Concession (LTC) and Home Leave Travel Concession (HLTC) to both teaching and non-teaching staff. Employees are entitled to House Rent Allowance (HRA) and Transport Allowance (TA). Retirement benefits such as GPF/CPF, gratuity, NPS, pension, and encashment of earned leave, along with loan facilities, are available to staff members. Free or subsidized healthcare services are provided through the WUS Health Centre, government hospitals, and empanelled private hospitals. Residential accommodations include a complex with 20 flats for teachers and 30 quarters for non-teaching staff, as well as a Teachers and Residents Welfare Association. The hostel offers furnished accommodation for the Hostel Warden and Resident Tutor. Miranda House supports the professional development of both teaching and non-teaching staff by organizing regular capacitybuilding and training programs. Additionally, counseling and support services are available, managed by a counselor and a network of certified professionals.

To evaluate the performance of its employees, Miranda House requires regular preparation of formal reports covering personal, academic, and extracurricular achievements. The Annual Reports (ARs) are submitted by the Teachers-in-Charge (TiC) of Departments and conveners of various societies and task groups, detailing their activities. Faculty members are responsible for updating their profiles on the college website, where they report their accomplishments, publications, evaluation duties, and studentfocused activities. To ensure a comprehensive performance review, students also provide feedback and reviews for faculty. Teaching faculty complete their Annual Performance Appraisal Report (APAR), which is then, scrutinized by IQAC followed by a screening/selection committee review for their career advancement. Regular internal and external financial audits are conducted to ensure compliance with relevant rules and regulations. MH prepares annual financial statements and budget forecasts following DU's guidelines. Payments are processed through the Public Finance Management System (PFMS) to ensure transparency in financial transactions. Funds received from government bodies and DU are authorized through certificates, attested and audited by the institutional Chartered Accountant. Financial records are

maintained according to the highest accounting standards and are subject to independent third-party audits. DU carries out internal audits to assess financial management practices and the proper maintenance of accounts. External audits are performed by auditors from the Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) office. MH promotes efficient budgeting, capping, and moderation to ensure sufficient financial resources for fostering innovation, while discouraging unnecessary spending.

Miranda House receives 100% Grants-in-Aid from the UGC to cover college maintenance and staff salaries. Budgets for Non-Plan and Planned expenditures are carefully planned. The Building Committee, Purchase Committee, and Accounts Office collaborate to ensure proper fund utilization, fiscal discipline, and transparency. All funds are processed through the Treasury Single Account and undergo thorough audits. Major expansion and construction projects are only initiated after receiving UGC's budgetary approval.

The college has set up several endowment awards for students, funded by contributions from alumnae, former faculty, and private donors. Each year, many awards, including the S K Trikha Memorial Award, are given on Founder's Day. Special awards are also presented to differently-abled students. Along with these endowments, academic excellence is regularly recognized through awards. Financial support is extended to students from socially and economically disadvantaged backgrounds. In 2023-24, several philanthropists like Ashok Nayyar and Geeta Nayyar as well as several faculty members, including former faculty Dr. Amrita T. The college supports a vibrant research culture, with several multidisciplinary research centers that promote faculty and student involvement in research. DSKC offers undergraduate students valuable research opportunities. Through Alumnae meets and mentorship programs, the college nurtures future leaders and inspires students to follow in the footsteps of these accomplished women. The Women Development Cell (WDC) plays a central role by organizing awareness programs on women's rights with an intersectional approach and heritage walks, while the Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) ensures compliance with legal standards for the prevention and redressal of sexual harassment. Women's health awareness initiatives, such as the 'Campaign on Cervical Cancer' and the 'Anaemia Programme,' including a blood test drive, have been pivotal in promoting women's health. In its commitment to inclusive education, the college also promotes the wellbeing of transgender individuals through the Miranda House Queer Collective. To support marginalized women, the Enactus, Entrepreneurship Cell, and Unnat Bharat Abhiyan initiatives equip them with entrepreneurial skills and create sustainable livelihood opportunities. The Skill-Hub for women, including the Millet Incubation Centre, offers employment to local women, supporting the goals of sustainability and women's empowerment. Additionally, the Accommodation Safety Guide, developed through a student-led survey, ensures secure living spaces for students. These initiatives demonstrate Miranda House's commitment to gender equity and empowerment in all aspects of campus life.

Miranda House exemplifies its dedication to sustainability through an array of innovative and collaborative initiatives. Spearheaded by MH Vatavaran and NSS volunteers, the College prioritizes antilitter efforts and efficient waste paper recycling, facilitated by a dedicated College Paper Recycling Unit. Advanced waste management practices are showcased through the Composting Unit, developed in partnership with an NGO, where biodegradable waste from the café and hostel kitchen is processed via a mechanical crusher to produce nutrient-rich compost for the gardens. Innovative projects include a hydroponics unit that recycles greywater for irrigation, while the Department of Chemistry leads green laboratory practices, ensuring proper hazardous waste management. Electronic waste is responsibly disposed of, complemented by MH Vatavaran's drives to collect items such as old laptops, electronic cables, pen drives and phones. Flagship initiatives like 'Single-Use Plastic Free Miranda,' the zero-waste partnership with Bisleri during Tempest, and PET bottle vertical gardens exemplify the College's progressive approach to sustainability, inspiring the broader community. The College is committed to combating Single-Use Plastic (SUP) through systematic waste segregation, recycling via authorized handlers, and periodic collection drives. Energy conservation initiatives, the adoption of solar photovoltaic systems, and strategic tree planting collectively reduce the College's carbon footprint, with an impressive absorption of 22.49 tons of carbon annually.
