#### Events/Seminars/conferences/workshops/Extension Activities organized

## 1) Screening of *Until and Unless*:

Date: 1st August, 2019

The South Asia Centre at the University of Pennsylvania and Kolkata Anandam for Equality collaborated with MHQC for a screening of the documentary *Until and Unless*, which showcased the impact of the oppressive legislations on queer lives, before the historic repealing of Section 377. The screening was followed by a discussion with queer activists from Kolkata Anandam and the filmmakers of the documentary.

## 2) Panel Discussion on 'Gender: Identity and Expression':

Date: 13th August 2019

MHQC hosted a panel discussion on Gender identities, gender expression, and the Trans Bill. The panelists included Ray, a trans woman pursuing LLB from Campus Law Centre, University of Delhi, and Kai, a Trans Gender queer person who has been a former member of MHQC and also initiated a Non-Binary Collective in Delhi known as Naan Biryani Dilli. The discussion covered gender dysphoria, identities, struggles faced by the Trans\* and non-binary communities and how these are exacerbated by draconian legislations.

#### 3) Prism, an Awareness Drive:

Date: 26th August 2019

For greater sensitisation on campus, MHQC held an awareness drive with a fundraiser through stalls as well as a film screening of the film *A Kid Like Jake*to give insights into gender identity and its development in children.

#### 4) Mental Health Workshop:

Date: 29th August 2019

As part of our Mental Health Programme wherein we spread awareness about mental health issues and help connect students in need with counsellors, therapists, and psychiatrists, MHQC held a Mental Health Workshop where Queer Affirmative psychologist Ipsa A James helped the attendees tackle some daily mental health concerns and answered their questions about influences on mental health and treatment through professionals.




## 5) The Science Behind LGTBQ+:

Date: 30th August 2019

So as to counter the misinformation about queer identities being 'unnatural' and the long-held biases in the field of natural sciences and psychology, MHQC invited Dr Bittu Karthik to explain how queer identities are completely natural and scientific, which was accompanied by a student presentation on queer people within the field of science as a lesson in both queer and science history.

## 6) Gumaan (with WDC and Adwitya):

Date: 4th September 2019

The Women's Development Cell, Miranda House, organised Gumaan as a celebration of Queer Pride along with MHQC and Adwitya. MHQC gave a presentation to clear up basic queer concepts and history to have greater sensitisation amongst allies of the queer community.

#### 7) Rainbow Connection:

Date: 5th September 2019

Rainbow Connection is a queer-only interactive session held by MHQC to allow queer individuals from within and outside of MHQC to have a safe space to mingle, share art and performances, and find a larger support group that they can rely on.




# 8) Screening of The Kids Are All Right:

**Date:** 16<sup>th</sup> September 2019

In collaboration with Celluloid, the Film Society of Miranda House, MHQC held a screening of *The Kids Are All Right*, a film about queer identities and familial structures. This was followed by a discussion led by MHQC members.

Number of participants - 60+






# 9) Art Against Violence:

Date: 9th January 2020

In light of political and communal tensions around the country, MHQC organised a demonstration against violence where artists presented their views through speeches, songs, and street plays. Number of participants - 55







# 10) Mental Health Workshop:

Date: 28th January 2020

MHQC organised a follow-up workshop with Ipsa A James to go into further detail about the factors affecting mental health of young people, especially so in the light of disturbed socio-political conditions.

#### 11) **Annual Fest – Iridescence:**

**Day 1** (10<sup>th</sup> February 2020): Number of participants - 60+





- Talk on Legislations as Tools of Marginalisation-This talk started off our annual fest with a
  discussion on how legislations have often been used by autocratic governments to further
  oppress marginalised communities. The talk was led by Ditilekha, a queer feminist student
  activist.
- Revolution Radio: A Singing Competition- This singing competition aimed to bring out the spirit of revolution in music and get the participants to not only explore songs, but their socio-political significance.
- Letters To Our Gay Awakenings: A Slam Poetry Competition-This Slam Poetry event asked participants to write their poetry to or about the people who helped them find this part of their identity.



## **Day 2** (11<sup>th</sup> February 2020):

• Panel on Gatekeeping Within The LGBTQIAP+ Community

This panel discussed the exclusion of identities within the Queer community, be it lack of awareness of asexuality, bimisia within the community, exclusion of Trans\* identities from activism, or a lack of intersectionality taking into account caste, class, racial, and religious divides.



# **Gender Equity Certificate Course on Gender and Sexuality:**

1. Date: 7th January – 4<sup>th</sup> February 2020

In collaboration with Nirantar Trust, MHQC provided a course on Gender and Sexuality for students of Miranda House which covered several topics relating to gender disparity, sexual education, and the queer community.
